Biodiversity

of our creepy crawly friends by using logs, sticks and leaves they found while exploring the old wooded area.



Last year we created a Hedgehog house from cardboard boxes, twigs and leaves and it was exciting to see a little hedgehog on the playground in the spring. It was, of course, rescued by Mr Lewis and taken to a safe place. Sites for our bird house and boxes have been established and we are looking forward to seeing these go up very soon! The children have also spent time weeding and tending to our

Wild Garden and have had great pleasure introducing it to members of their class to study the plants and flowers that



grow there during their science lessons. They have added a nice little resting water station for the bees and butterflies and learnt a lot about pollination and the importance of it.
